Step 3: Register to enter Homecraft and let us know which Sections you plan to enter

Step 4: Make your creations

Step 5: Receive your Exhibitor tags and attach them to your entries

- The extended deadline is **Monday, June 1, 2026**. Extended Entrants will receive tags when entries are delivered to the Fair. Tags must then be attached by the Entrant. No registrations will be accepted thereafter.

Dropping off your Entries at the Brooklin Spring Fair

Step 6: Bring your entries to the Fair. When your entries are checked in, you'll receive Claim Tags that you'll need to show to pick up your entries

- Entries are to be delivered to the Luther Vipond Arena (67 Winchester Rd. E.) either on
 - **Wednesday, June 3, 6:30 pm - 8:30 pm and /or**
 - **Thursday, June 4, 8:00 am - 10:00 am.**
 - THE ARENA DOORS WILL BE CLOSED AND LOCKED AT 10:00 AM SHARP.
- The Homecraft display area will be closed to the public on **Thursday, June 4** from **10:00 am to 6:00 pm.**
- Entries will be on display from **Thursday, June 4 at 6:00 pm** until **Sunday, June 7 at 5:00 pm.**

Step 7: Visit the arena during the Fair to see your creations and see how you did!

Picking up your Entries after the Fair

Step 8: When the Fair is concluded on Sunday, come and pick up your creations and your prizes

- Homecraft display area will be closed to the public on **Sunday, June 7 from 5:00 - 6:00 pm.**
- While Homecraft is closed, exhibitors are asked to wait outside the exhibit area until display areas are made accessible.
- Exhibits must be picked up on **Sunday, June 7 between 6:00 pm and 7:00 pm.**
- Claim numbers must be shown for release of exhibits.
- Articles not claimed by 7:00 pm on **Sunday, June 7** will be discarded. If you are unable to pick up your exhibits please arrange for someone else to pick up. Please provide them with your claim tags.

Brooklin Spring Fair Homecraft General Rules

1. All entries may be submitted on the printed Entry Form provided in this prize list catalogue or in the format displayed on the website. Entry Forms can be photocopied if more space is required. Entry Forms must be dated and signed by the exhibitor.
2. Entry Tags must be AFFIXED to the article before drop-off by either tape or a pin unless otherwise noted in the Class rules. The Tag must be folded to conceal the exhibitor's name.
3. All work must be that of the exhibitor.
4. All exhibitors must be amateurs.
5. All exhibits must not have been previously shown at the Brooklin Spring Fair and will not be judged as a result.
6. No person shall enter more than one article per Section unless otherwise noted.
7. All entries must be suitable for a family-friendly setting.
8. Any questions pertaining to specific exhibits should be directed to the Class chairperson.
9. Items will be judged in accordance to the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) Judging Standards book or the Ontario Horticultural Judging Standards book.
10. Items entered will be judged at the Judge's discretion based on merit and Judges are not obligated to award a 1st prize in any Class.
11. The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage to or accident to any person or property during the time of the Brooklin Spring Fair. Should any entry be accidentally damaged, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all the assistance in their power towards its recovery, but will not make any payment for the value thereof.
12. All prize money is donated by the Brooklin Spring Fair Agricultural Society unless otherwise stated.
13. Exhibitors, in Classes where stated, with the most points in a Class will be awarded a prize of either money, a gift or a gift certificate. Points are awarded as follows:
 - 1st prize = 4 points
 - 2nd prize = 3 points
 - 3rd prize = 2 points
 - 4th prize = 1 point

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Class 100 – Quilts and Quilting

General Class Rules:

1. Entries must be the work of the exhibitor within the last two years, clean and odour free.
2. Colour, design, binding and construction will be judged.
3. Articles to be exhibited are to be the work of amateurs only. We are defining an amateur as one who receives less than 25% of their income from the craft they exhibit
4. Machine quilting refers to longarm or domestic machines.
5. Other than OAAS entries, hand quilting may contain machine piecing and binding – no quilts quilted by a group charging for the service.
6. In the group quilting category, enter under one exhibitor's name and indicate names of other group members on the back of the entry tag.
7. If using a commercial pattern, the name of the pattern designer must be included on the tag
8. Quilts entered in Sections 117, 118, 119 may qualify to be entered into the OAAS quilt competition. Please note the specific rules for OAAS quilts below.

101. Baby Quilt
102. Group Quilt

OAAS Machine & Hand Quilted Competition Rules

1. The quilt must be solely made and quilted by the exhibitor.
2. Quilts to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches (810 cm). Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All 4 sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.
3. The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.
4. The winning OAAS Machine & Hand Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future OAAS fair, district and/or provincial competitions.
5. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules.
6. The use of domestic, mid arm and / or long arm equipment is permitted for machine quilt entries.
7. OAAS Hand Quilt and Hand Appliqued Quilt must be hand quilted solely by the exhibitor.

1. All items are to be hand knit or crocheted, unless otherwise stated, clean and odour free.
2. Articles may have been worn but must be cleaned before being exhibited.
3. All afghans must be a minimum of 101.6 cm x 152.4 cm (40" x 60")
4. Baby afghans must be a minimum of 61.0 cm x 91.4 cm (24" x 36")

201. Knitted afghan. Minimum 45" x 54"
202. Knitted lap blanket, baby afghan or carriage cover

Knit a hat suitable for a newborn baby, no bigger than 34 cm circumference, using acrylic or acrylic blend only, light weight or worsted weight. No pom poms, buttons, or ties. All entries will be donated to Knitting and Crochet for Community, Durham Region and Beyond and given to associated charities

226. Crochet Lap Blanket for Seniors

Crochet a lap blanket suitable for a senior citizen. No bulky yarns – worsted weight or lighter. All items will be donated to Knitting and Crochet for Community, Durham Region and Beyond to be given out to local seniors' homes and hospitals

Additional "Specials" items not suitable for competition, but that you'd like to donate to Knitting and Crochet for Community, Durham Region, may be dropped off on Sunday at the conclusion of the Fair

Class 300 – Sewing

1. Articles may have been worn but must be cleaned and odor free before being exhibited and may not be more than 2 years old.

311. Cat Enclosure Cover.
Whitby Animal Services often intake traumatized cats who are comforted and calmed by having covers over their enclosures so they can be hidden from other animals and people.
Materials needed for 311 Cat Enclosure Cover
Fabric
2 buttons

Directions

1. Cut 2 piece of fabric, 23” x 23” for cover
2. Cut 4 pieces of fabric, 1.5” x 3.5” for tabs
3. Sew both tabs. With right sides together, sew around the edge leaving one small side open
4. Clip corners and turn tabs right side out, pressing out the corners
5. Sew a button hold on the finished end of each tab
6. Pin the 2 cover pieces right sides together. On each corner of the top edge, place each tab inside. The open end of the tab should be lined up with the outed edge of the cover
7. Stitch around the cover edge leaving an opening for turning
8. Clip corners and turn the cover right side out, pressing corners. Top stitch around the entire cover closing the opening
9. Sew a button on each corner of the cover where the tabs are located

10. Create a buttonhole on the end of each tab

490. Fleece Lap Blanket, by individual or group (group must be named)

Materials needed for Fleece Lap Blanket:

- Two pieces of fleece (minimum width 88.9 cm (35") and minimum length 101.6 cm. ' (40"), Creativity permitted. Kid-friendly patterns or colours preferred.

Directions

1. With right sides together, sew a 1.3 cm (1/2 ") seam along the long sides of the blanket. Leave top and bottom edges open.
2. Turn blanket right side out and lay flat.
3. Place a strip of masking tape across the width of the blanket 15.24 cm (6") from the top and bottom edges to form fringe. Make sure to cut both layers of fleece.
4. Carefully remove tape and knot the top and bottom fringes together to stabilize layers.
5. If needed, stitch a 25.4-38.1 cm (10-15") square in center of blanket to further stabilize the layers.

1. All entries must be the work of the contributor, clean and odour free
2. All entries must be ready for display
3. If using a commercial pattern, the name of the pattern designer must be included on the tag

Class 600 – Culinary Arts

1. Cakes and loaves must be displayed on foil covered cardboard.
2. Other items are to be displayed on a disposable plain white plate (Chinet acceptable).
3. Entries must be covered with a CLEAR plastic bag or re-sealable bag.
4. Entry tag must be attached to outside bag on the non-open end.
5. No warm or hot food.
6. No mixes nor microwaving allowed.
7. All loaves must be cut vertically.
8. No pie (or tart, cookie, or cake) filling shall come from a can.
9. The Brooklin Spring Fair is not responsible for items consumed from the Culinary Arts Class.
10. Please follow specific instructions for each Section, if the Class Rules are not followed, the entry will not be judged.
11. No cannabis plants, products, or edibles may be entered in any category.

Decorated Cakes:

1. May use an artificial or Styrofoam cake base. The 'cake' does not need to be edible

OAAS Butter Tarts Competition

In addition to the General Class Rules above,

1. Winner agrees to compete at District 4 level Annual Meeting in October 2026.
2. The winning tarts from District go on to the Provincial competition at the OAAS Annual Convention in Toronto, February 2027. Winner agrees to bake another batch using the same recipe for the OAAS competition.
3. Must be 6 full size tarts (no mini or bite size) on a clean sturdy plate (no paper plates) inside of a clear plastic bag.
4. Tarts must not contain fruit or nuts (i.e., no raisins, no pecans)
5. Entry must be solely made by the person entering competition (including pastry)

OAAS Butter Tarts Competition Judging Standards

Material needed for 1711 T-Shirt Ball Dog Toy

- An old T-shirt (clean)
- A tennis ball
- Scissors
- Tape measure or ruler

Directions

1. Cut the fabric into two strips, six (6) inches wide and fourteen (14) inches long
2. Lay the fabric stripes on a flat surface in the shape of an “X” and place the tennis ball in the middle
3. Fold the fabric over the ball several times and tie the fabric securely around the ball. Make sure to leave enough fabric on each fabric strip to make a tail
4. Cut each fabric tail into three (3) strips, roughly two (2) inches wide. Be careful not to cut the fabric off of the toy!
5. Braid the fabric strips and tie the ends as tight as possible making sure there are no gaps between the braids. Tie knots at the end of the braid with excess fabric to secure the braids. The tighter everything is tied the more durable the toy will be
6. The dog toy is complete!

Material needed for 1712 Scrappy Crinkle Cat Toy

Scraps of fabric

A chip or treat bag

String

Stick or wand

Directions

1. Cut two layers from your fabric in the shape of your choice. A fish, mouse, bird, or anything else a cat might like.
2. With right sides together, sew front and back of your toy together along the edges. Leave an opening for turning.
3. Turn your toy right side out, pressing out the corners.
4. Cut two layers from your chip bag in the same shape but a little bit smaller.
5. Insert chip bag shapes into your toy and add a couple of stitches along the opening to keep it in place.
6. Tie a knot in a piece of string and insert it into the toy opening. Stitch it closed.
7. Tie the other end of the string to the wand or stick
